





This photo came up in my Facebook memories and took me right back—five years ago. We were a small consortium presenting our ConCOVE proposal face-to-face at TEC in Wellington. It was a five-year plan we'd poured our hearts into, with Simon doing most of the heavy lifting on the writing.


The interview panel was tough, and after all that work, it felt like a flop. We walked out thinking it had all been for naught and headed to the pub to drown our sorrows.

Two weeks later, we found out we were successful. It was a reminder that sometimes your impact lands even when it doesn't feel like it at the time. Grateful for the team, the kaupapa, and where it's all led. (And I'm going to be completely not humble here: it was my idea to ensure we centred Māori, Pacific Peoples, and Wāhine/Women in the proposal.)











- 93% believe ConCOVE increased collaboration.
- 94% say ConCOVE increased sharing of practice and evidence.
- •95% find our recommendations practical.
- 98% of women, 94% of Māori, and 88% of Pasifika respondents believe ConCOVE's work benefits them.
